Introduction

Good News!

Welcome to a study of Luke—one of four books called Gospels in the New Testament. Matthew, Mark, and John wrote the other Gospels. *Gospel* means *the good news about Jesus, and the salvation He offers to all people*.

The Gospel Writers

Each writer had a special plan. Each wrote about Jesus' life and purpose from a different point of view.

- Matthew tells of Jesus as the Messiah (the Christ).
- Mark presents Jesus as the Servant of the Lord.
- Luke speaks of Jesus as the Son of Man who is the Savior of all people.
- John shares of Jesus as the Son of God.

Before They Followed Jesus

The Gospel writers had other jobs before they became followers of Jesus. Matthew was a tax collector and John was a fisherman. Luke was a doctor; he also wrote the book of Acts. He wrote his Gospel to show that everyone can have salvation. Luke gave more details of Jesus' life than any other Gospel writer.

Luke was not an eyewitness to Jesus' life. He talked to people who knew Jesus well—the disciples, other believers, and perhaps even Jesus' mother, Mary.

It's About Jesus

As we study Luke, you will see Jesus as...

- a helpless baby, who needs His parents.
- a child who grows up.
- a 12-year-old boy who amazes His teachers with His spiritual understanding.
- an obedient son who returns home with His parents.

See Jesus as He...

- is baptized.
- prays.
- heals and comforts.
- teaches the crowds.
- walks upon the sea.
- goes to the cross and rises from the dead.

Jesus is alive today! You, too, can walk with Him as you believe that He died for you, and you can invite Him to live in your heart and guide your life forever!
